



Project: Monument & Canoe House

This project involved the re-development of the pedestrianised area around the Monument to the Great Fire of London.

A stunning glass pavilion was constructed with fifty-six mirrors fitted to the roof to reflect the golden orb at the top of the monument. The pavilion has a disabled toilet and staff facilities.

The basic pod unit was imported from Sweden, clad in gabion cages, filled with Caithness stone and over clad in glass.

The Canoe House site was a bomb site from World War II. The area was cleared out and completely decked over with French oak on a grid work of steel supports. The area now provides an accessible space for Londoners and tourists to relax.
